Ruth's grandparents were Annie Darlington and Isaac Passmore. The Darlington family established a nursery near the crossroads of Birmingham and Lenape roads in the early 1700's and supplied fresh fruits and vegetables to the residents of the village. Entrikin's mill, later known as Strode's Mill, was the center of the crossroads. A general store and a blacksmith shop were added on the Passmore property as the village grew. Isaac Passmore came from the Oxford area and established Passmore Roses, one of the largest and earliest rose growers in Chester County. The rose business operated under the Passmore family for three generations and was sold in the early 1970's.

Here is an aerial view of Passmore Roses' lands looking towards Strode's crossroads. Passmore Roses' greenhouses are in the bottom left corner and Young's Garage (started by Ruth's husband, David Young) is to the right.



Ruth grew up in these houses at 1033 Lenape Road and 1025 Lenape Road:
